FROM THE PRESIDENT



On Saturday, January 28, Oldenburg Academy dedicated our newly installed "Sponsorship Mural" in the main hallway of the Academic Building. This was the kick-off event of the Academy's 165th anniversary year and there is no more fitting activity than to honor the legacy of sponsorship that the Sisters have provided for us from the beginning. We are blessed to be their FIRST sponsored ministry and continuing their legacy is our highest priority.

Since I first arrived at OA over four years ago, I have searched for a way to create a permanent tribute in our Academic Building – the building now most associated with the Academy - to the vision and values that inspired the Sisters to found the Academy way back in 1852. Fifty years ago, Sr. Therese de Lourdes Galm and Mother Marie Dillhoff helped to lay the cornerstones for the buildings that currently house the challenge, acceptance, and preparation that exists at OA today. It is important for current and future generations to be surrounded by the faces of these courageous women, to reflect upon their past challenges and accomplishments, and to remain steadfast in the core values. These core sponsorship values are emblazoned on this mural. They literally "stand out" as a constant reminder of what we are called every day to be faithful to, inspired by, and focused on fulfilling. Efforts to integrate the Franciscan sponsorship values into our lives are strengthened and enriched by prayer. Therefore, we have chosen "prayer" as the first of these values that has been serving as a theme for this school year. Other values will be chosen in the future.

You are most welcome to stop in the school at any time and have a look. Special thanks to the OA/ICA Alumni Association for their funding assistance and to Sr. Rose Marie Weckenmann for her invaluable support in this wonderful project.

Next on the "celebration list" was to honor Twice Blessed, OA's Resale store located in Batesville, as our "Outstanding Volunteer". Over its 10-year history, TB has raised over \$250,000 in tuition assistance for OA students! But that's not all. Twice Blessed also provides assistance to many local families in need: household fire victims, individuals in financial need, and people recommended by local churches. Every new client at Safe Passage, a local women's shelter, is given a chance to 'shop for free' to get essential clothing/supplies when they first arrive. Twice Blessed also provides donations to local church rummage sales.

Other events are planned throughout the year including honoring 15 years of the Adopt A Sis program and launching some next steps of our strategic plan. All events are designed with a single mission in mind – to continue the tradition of academic excellence, faith formation, and commitment to service and leadership that the Sisters of St. Francis first gave birth to in this little 'Burg.



While there are many remarkable statistics that describe OA, none stands out more than the fact that 90% of our students participate in one or more extracurricular activities. Research has demonstrated that students who are actively engaged in school beyond the classroom are more successful academically, less likely to experience negative behaviors, and develop skills that will last a lifetime. They also become the most sought after employees by future employers.

The following are some examples of our grads making a difference in the world who first made their mark at OA.



Please give us the highlights of what you have been doing since graduating from OA.

I went to the University of Notre Dame to study Civil Engineering. Since graduation, I have been working for Kiewit Power Constructors both pricing and building power plants. My first major project was to help build a retrofit to clean up emissions on a coal generating station in Southwestern Indiana and am currently building a new combined cycle natural gas power plant in Northern Indiana.

What activities were you involved in at OA? Have you continued to be involved with any similar activities since graduating?

I participated in soccer, cross country, track and golf. I was also involved in academic team, student council, National Honor Society and Adopt-A-Sis. Although I no longer play team sports, I enjoy exercising with my wife, Erin. Studying history and traveling are also favorite activities. What do you consider the most important qualities or life skills you learned by being involved with a club, program and/or playing on a team at OA?

The importance of common goals, collaboration and holding each other accountable are keys to success of an organization or team. As an individual, planning ahead, setting priorities and having determination to make things happen generally yield successful outcomes. My experiences at OA and the friends I made while in Oldenburg programs helped form these beliefs and work ethic. More importantly, I still have these friendships today.

Please share a story about how involvement in extracurriculars at OA has helped you be a better employee and/or find success in life.

Last year, a project that I helped lead was awarded Power Project of the Year which is quite an honor as Kiewit is a very large company. I feel that our project's success was a combination of a good team working well together, hard work and honest ethics – skills and values emphasized at Oldenburg.



Please give us the highlights of what you have been doing since graduating from OA.

I attended the University of Indianapolis and received my Bachelors of Science degree in Athletic Training after my graduation from Oldenburg. I then worked as the first head athletic trainer at a high school in Kentucky before returning to the University of Indianapolis and completing my Doctorate of Physical Therapy. Upon graduation, I moved to North Carolina for a year and completed my Orthopaedic Physical Therapy Residency at Duke Health. Most recently, I moved back to Batesville and have been working at Decatur County Memorial Hospital as a Physical Therapist since August.


What activities were you involved in at OA? Have you continued to be involved with any similar activities since graduating?

While attending Oldenburg, I played volleyball, basketball, and softball for four years. I was also an active member in several clubs such as National Honor Society, Student Government, and Foreign Language Club. After graduation, I was a member of the Athletic Training Club at the University of Indianapolis. Additionally, I played on several recreational sports leagues as well as doing some assistant coaching for volleyball and softball. What do you consider the most important qualities or life skills you learned by being involved with a club, program and/or playing on a team at OA?

I would have to say that the most important skills I learned while I was a student at OA were time management and teamwork. These skills have been extremely helpful in both my professional and personal life. They have allowed me to successfully complete my schooling as well as become an engaged and passionate employee.

Please share a story about how involvement in extracurriculars at OA has helped you be a better employee and/or find success in life.

Learning to work as a team was an integral skill to have during my undergraduate and graduate education. I was required to complete numerous group projects throughout my schooling which made it essential to work together to achieve a common goal. This skill assisted me in the work place; because, no matter the job, it is extremely important to be able to work with others to create a positive and productive work environment.



Please give us the highlights of what you have been doing since graduating from OA.

After graduating from OA I attended Indiana University and earned a BA in Telecommunications. I went on to intern with Major League Soccer for 6 months in New York City and then moved to Salt Lake City, UT where I worked for Real Salt Lake (Major League Soccer) as Multimedia Coordinator. After 4 years with Real Salt Lake I moved to Portland, OR to work for the Portland Timbers as Video Content Manager.

What activities were you involved in at OA? Have you continued to be involved with any similar activities since graduating?

I also took music lessons and played in the orchestra. At IU I minored in music and played bass guitar in a band. We spent one summer out on tour and also recorded an album in New York that was available in music stores across the country. Soccer has continued to be a large part of my life, working in the sport for the last 5 years and I still play in my free time.

What do you consider the most important qualities or life skills you learned by being involved with a club, program and/or playing on a team at OA?

Being involved in music and sports at OA taught me dedication as-well-as how to work together to achieve a goal. The same dedication needed in these activities is required to continually improve on my craft. Being part of a relatively small broadcast department it is necessary that everyone works together to produce quality content.

Please share a story about how involvement in extracurriculars at OA has helped you be a better employee and/or find success in life.

While at OA I played varsity soccer and golf all four years. My freshman year at OA, the soccer team beat East Central to win sectionals. It didn't seem likely that such a small school, with only a 3 year-old boy's soccer program, would be able to win. We put the work in before the game, had the belief and pulled it off. When applying to internships and jobs within Major League Soccer, it seemed almost impossible. There were only 4 internships a year offered in my field and less than 20 jobs across the country, but it's amazing what you can accomplish when you are dedicated to achieving your goals and have the belief to do so.

Please give us the highlights of what you have been doing since graduating from OA.

Since OA graduation, I have interned at Safe Passage, Inc., traveled abroad, participated in leadership roles at DePauw University, earned Deans List most semesters, and graduated with a Bachelors of Arts in English. Most

notably and recently, I have been teaching for almost two years at an urban high school in Indianapolis as a Teach for America corps member. In each of these major experiences, I have pushed myself to think critically about my role in changing the unequal systems in our world; I have become confident in my ability to succeed at whatever I put my mind to; I have become mindful of loving myself in order to love others; and I have enjoyed maintaining old relationships and building new ones.

What activities were you involved in at OA? Have you continued to be involved with any similar activities since graduating?

I was involved in

sports (soccer and tennis and two years of swimming) and music (orchestra, Academy Singers, piano lessons) at OA. Thanks to having the opportunity to learn the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle, I have continued to stay active since graduating. I run (finished a half marathon – barely – and some other fun races), do yoga (looking into becoming an instructor!), play tennis (not nearly enough – much to my dad's dismay), and take lots of walks and bike rides on the Monon Trail in Indy.

What do you consider the most important qualities or life skills you learned by being involved with a club, program and/or playing on a team at OA?

I excel in my current role because of my leadership,

empathy, tenacity, and ingenuity. Extracurricular activities at OA were fundamental in the development of these traits.

Please share a story about how involvement in extracurriculars at OA has helped you be a better employee



and/or find success in life.

As a freshman on the OA tennis team, my coach told me to play #1 singles for my first time on the night of our toughest match (East Central - ugh!). I remember the frustration of feeling like I was set up for failure, I remember the nervousness I had as I was pushed out of my comfort zone, and I remember the dejectedness of losing. My dad always says, "When given the option to play or not to play, play." I played that match to the best of my ability, lost, went back to practice the next day and vowed to myself to be better than I was the day before. Sure enough – by the time I graduated, that

tennis team made it to semi-state twice and has been Regional Champs for many consecutive years since.

When I accepted my offer with Teach for America, I did exactly what my coach did to (and for) me 6 years prior – I willingly put myself in a position where failure of some sort would happen daily, where I was leaping out of my comfort zone to teach low-performing, underprivileged children, where I would set goals to achieve success despite adversity. Though I've wanted to quit every time a 15-year-old student struggles to pronounce a simple word, I show up – or "play" in my dad's words -- each day. I do so because those challenges allow me to experience moments of success. I view my primary roles in the world to love others and to be a gentle warrior – I don't plan to stop loving or "playing" until my goals are met.




Oldenburg Academy Easter Egg Hunt

Holly, a 1974 ICA/OA alum, was a beloved educator, coach, mentor and faith filled member of the community who tragically lost her life due to a drunk driver. 
Ammann Brinkmoeller Hall of Fame Inductees
