### LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

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### FRANCISCAN-JUSTICE & PEACE

#### Prayer before the CRUCIFIX

Most holy, glorious God, enlighten the darkness of my heart and give me true faith, certain hope and perfect charity, sense and knowledge, Lord, that I may carry out Your holy and true command.

Justice and Peace is the Franciscan value that OA will be focused on this year. Diane asked me to share a little bit about the importance of this value for Franciscans. It seems as if the school's tag-line *"Go Beyond"* is really appropriate as this value is explored and lived.

Pope Francis said, "To understand peace and justice through the lense of Franciscan spirituality we have to understand the man, Francis, a man of poverty, a man of peace, a man who loves and protects creation".

Francis of Assisi went to the crusades as every young Italian male did. After Francis was imprisoned during the Crusades Francis realized he did not want to fight against other human beings. Then he heard the message to rebuild Christ's Church. He did just that, rebuilt the little Church. Eventually it became clear to him that he was to *go beyond* and rebuild the Church through his love for the poor, his gift of preaching. He preached to the people the Gospel of peace and salvation.

You may know the story of Francis embracing the leper. This action was so hard for him but he felt that push of the Spirit to do it. He heard the call to **go beyond** what was comfortable for him. In touching the flesh of the poor, he knew he was touching the flesh of Christ.

From the Gospels he understood that he was to be one with the poor, the broken. There is where he found Jesus. Francis grasped God's creative presence in all people, in all things. He grasped that we are all connected.

### Justice and peace is about how we treat one another. Justice and peace is about respect and acceptance. It is about seeing the big picture.

It is about going beyond the comfortable and the known, being curious about the unknown and being open to the unknown.

Our Rule states "The sisters and brothers are called to heal the wounded, to bind up those who are bruised and to reclaim the erring."

Our Constitution says "We are attentive to the cry of the poor and oppressed and the need to work for justice and peace."

Our Community has always served in the poorer schools and in rural parishes. WE began by taking in orphans and teaching children and women. We continue that focus. We continue to help support those who work directly with the poor and the underserved. We continue to ask ourselves how we can *go beyond* the familiar and the comfortable.

Living as a Franciscan means we make efforts to live a GOSPEL WAY OF LIFE.

As our OA students and faculty look at the Franciscan/ Christian value of justice and peace, they have the wonderful sources of Scripture, the words and actions of St. Francis, the Catholic Social Justice teachings, and hopefully, the modeling of the Sisters of St. Francis as guides.

### MOMENTS OF RESILIENCE AT THE ACADEMY


When alumni, parents, and members of the OA family look back on the year 2020, what will they recall? Our hope is that in terms of the Academy, it will be remembered as an example of another time of great challenge that ultimately became a source of strength and resilience in our capacity to move forward with our mission despite unimaginable circumstances. Just like these moments...

#### The Great Fire of 1857

The heavy snowfall and crisp wintry air that blanketed Oldenburg on January 23, 1857 soon became blackened and smoke-filled as the Sisters' six-year old convent, school, and chapel burned to the ground. Mother Superior Theresa Hackelmeier was severely injured in the fire. Upon her recovery she was forced to adopt a true mendicant spirit as she went begging for financial support in Cincinnati and St. Louis in order to rebuild. By November of that same year, new structures had begun to replace those that had been destroyed and the Sisters were again able to serve the local community.

"During the following year the Sisters had a larger enrollment in every department: 14 in the orphanage, 27 in the academy, and 125 in the village school. In a literal sense the community had been tried by fire and had not been found wanting. They entered the year 1858 with renewed courage and dogged determination to retrieve their losses. That year also brought one achievement particularly appealing to their Franciscan spiritualty... Father Rudolf solemnly blessed the Sisters' new chapel, dedicating it to Our Blessed Lady, Immaculate .... (giving) all the Congregation's important actions to (her) protection and honor."

#### The Influenza Pandemic of 1918/19

Between October and the end of 1918, 4 Sisters had died at Oldenburg and many others were afflicted. On December 3rd, a number of children became sick and others were dismissed to their homes as soon as possible. One of the students who would have graduated later that year, Alma Kuntzler, had gone home to St. Bernard, OH and then became sick and died.

"The sickness diminished little by little and after the feast of the Three Magi, (January 6, 1919) the Academy was in session once more. The pupils returned and also new ones appeared so the school year was well blessed and had grown in attendance. Also, the pupils showed themselves better behaved this year."

#### The Death of a Beloved Teacher



"Teachers and students will always have a place in their hearts for Mr. Kelly Munchel. The loss of a trusted friend and teacher was felt on January 10, 1976 when Mr. Munchel passed away. A life-long resident of Oldenburg, Mr. Munchel came to ICA in 1965. He taught World History, World Cultures, Psychology, Civics, and Economics. He was the moderator of NHS and the Senior Class. He was especially noted for the way he made his classes interesting as well as educational. Some of his favorite expressions were "quote, quote" and "glitter, glitter".... a sure (visitor tour) stop was Room 105 to view Mr. Munchel's mobiles, plants, old history projects and knickknacks. Once when asked why he had all those things in his room, he replied that if the students weren't looking at


him, at least their attention would stay in the room. We will always remember him as a person who was never without a smile or a kind word. He was a teacher of outstanding dedication... there are no words to express how much he will be missed..." - *Concept*, ICA Yearbook, 1976

A scholarship was established in his name shortly after Kelly Munchel's death. Over

the years this fund has benefitted dozens of students with much needed tuition assistance, ensuring that the gift of an Academy education now inspired by a new generation of educators, remains accessible. Memorial donations to this fund continue to be received in his honor each year.

### GRAND OPENING HILLENBRAND FAMILY FELDHAUS

We are all learning a lot these days about patience, perseverance and faith. And while this sentiment applies to much in our day to day lives, the Hillenbrand Family Feldhaus is also testimony that even an extraordinary vision can eventually come to fruition! Some members of the OA community may recall that shortly after the Academy welcomed young men to join us

back in 2000, discussions began about how our facilities needed to expand to serve a growing number and diversity of students and their curricular and co-curricular needs. The first of many plans were drawn up – and though it took almost 20 years, we think it was worth waiting for. One of our goals of this project was to raise the profile of Oldenburg – the village as well as the school. We believe this beautiful Feldhaus is already doing just that.

The Feldhaus is the first major building to be built by the Academy in over 50 years. A capital campaign was launched in March of 2017 to raise funds. A ground-breaking ceremony was held in October of 2018 but site complications stalled excavation work until April of 2019. The building was 98% complete this past March when COVID-19 struck.

The final touches were completed in early July and the grand opening was held on August 3, 2020.

With over 10,000 sq ft of air conditioned playing surface and a 900-person seating capacity, a huge entrance lobby/gathering space, a spacious mezzanine overlooking the court, men's and women's locker rooms, an ample concession stand and modern accessible restrooms, this facility will serve OA and the larger community for decades to come. The facade mirrors the exterior

of the main academic building and auditorium creating a harmonious and visually appealing addition to our picturesque campus. The lobby is both beautiful and functional as it features two large graphic panels showcasing examples of the Academy spirit through the decades, digital projection of the Ammann-Brinkmoeller Athletic Hall of Fame and upcoming events/ sponsorships, and live streaming of the game. Above this wall is printed the opening stanza of the Alma Mater that begins: "Come all ye friends of our loved alma mater ... "

There are so many people to acknowledge and thank – this

facility is truly the embodiment of the hard work, dedication, and unfailing belief of many. The Sisters must be first on this list for without their courage and fortitude to found, maintain, and sponsor the Academy for over 168 years, none of this would ever be. Their gift of the land to build on and the deeding of the other school buildings and grounds were true "leadership gifts" that launched our campaign.

We were blessed with great architects (Steed, Hammond and

Paul), builders (Bruns-Gutzwiller), and so many individual companies that stepped up and provided their services, expertise, resources, and guidance.

Special thanks to: New Point Stone/Wanstrath Family, Hirt & Ellco, Chris Geis Electronics, Chad Miles/ETC, Stone Studio, Keith Moenter/Delta Faucet, Alumni Association, Freudenfest Committee, Friendship Bank and the Build Committee - Angie Harmeyer '86, Roger Kirschner, Patrick Kolks '10, Diane Laake, Darryl Maslar, Brian McFee, Todd Reed, Ray Ronnebaum, Anne Suttmann '97, and Mike Wilhelm -- who brought insight, expertise, tenacity and vision to bring this project from inception to reality.

We are blessed in this

community to have an extraordinary spirit of service and generosity. The Hillenbrand Family Foundations have been the undisputed leaders and role models in supporting the dreams and aspirations of individuals, non-profits and the local community for decades. It's hard to imagine what Batesville/Oldenburg would be without them? They came forward early on with leadership gifts of support that gave us the confidence to move forward with this project. We could not have done this without you!

> When we begin a major endeavor we should always be mindful that the original dreams and goals may shift "during flight". Who could have imagined that the Feldhaus would play a major role in OA's capacity to be able to open school during a pandemic? As we struggled with how to welcome, educate and feed our students in a safe and socially

distant manner, we realized that the Feldhaus provided us ample space to accomplish these priorities. Lunch is served out of



Oldenburg Academy has always been on the leading edge of leveraging technology and inspired teaching to advance our students' capacity for growth, innovation, and success.

We have also been receptive to the ever-changing job market and demands of the local community. After speaking with representatives from area business and industries, including Hillenbrand, Batesville (Casket), Batesville Tool & Die, and others, they affirmed that the demands on high schools and their classrooms need to continue to evolve. OA has a comprehensive internship program that provides hands-on experience in the manufacturing sector; however, students need to have opportunities to cultivate manufacturing, problem-solving skills and explore opportunities in order to enhance and build the local workforce.

Our next giant leap in preparing our students for success was to renovate an existing classroom into a flexible learning Makerspace where students work collaboratively on projects that encourage using creative solutions to explore integrating science, technology, engineering, art and math. Funds were needed to purchase flexible furniture, tools such as 3D printers and laser cutters, electronics and robotics kits, and teacher curriculum integration materials.

Through the generosity of many attendees at February's Dinner Auction and the Rising Sun and Ripley County Regional Foundations, OA was able to secure the funding needed to create this exciting new space. We are very grateful!



Donors (individuals or corporations) are eligible for a 50% credit against their state tax liability for contributions made through a Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) in addition to their regular federal tax deduction. For example, a \$1000 donation provides OA with enough money to fund 2 \$500 tuition assistance awards to families who qualify. And the donor receives a \$500 credit on their Indiana taxes plus an estimated \$350 credit on their federal taxes. Out of pocket expenses = \$150. A "win-win" for everyone!
