Oldenburg Academy's Board of Trustees and President Diane Laake and her leadership team recently completed the strategic planning process and we are pleased to share with you a new strategic plan to guide the school over the next few years. The strategic plan was developed using the direct contributions from the OA community including faculty, staff, students, parents and the board.

This plan invites active participation of all OA stakeholders as we build upon our strengths, address our opportunities, and work to realize our potential. A large number of strategies and action plans will emerge from the stated goals. Some will be administrative in nature; some will require significant tactical development; some will call upon the diverse skills and talents of our community. We will continually assess the effectiveness of our actions against these goals, and we will be accountable to our stakeholders for the progress made toward them. LEARNING. Education is ever changing. Once a school to educate Postulants, Oldenburg Academy, became a college preparatory school for young men and women. The demands of a high school education are shifting again. Oldenburg Academy students have access to overwhelming amounts of information. The call for us to be stewards of our planet grows louder, and faith, always at the heart of what we do, now extends far beyond any single boundary both geographically and metaphorically. We know the world in which our students will walk will demand an understanding of multiple perspectives and that plurality will be the norm. **GOAL:** Assess current school resources to execute specialized academic support programs and define future needs and methodology for measuring success.

TEACHING. Teachers and their passion for the classroom represent Oldenburg Academy's greatest and most significant asset. While continuously developing the skills of any faculty is essential, strengthening and re-envisioning professional development will be critical for ongoing excellence. The development of faculty cannot be seen as episodic; rather, it needs to be lifelong and sustained. **GOAL:** Targeted professional development expectations and teacher compensation based on appropriate models, individualized evaluation and market rate.

ENROLLMENT. Improving diversity, educational offerings and finances will all require increased enrollment at OA. **GOAL:** Achieve enrollment of 210, annual retention rate of 97% and 40% enrollment from tributary elementary schools by 2023-24.

FINANCES. The value of an Oldenburg Academy education far exceeds the price of tuition; it is an investment in every student. While continuing to meet the promise of that potential and support innovative programs, we must do so within a plan of affordability and sustainability firmly grounded in endowment growth, enrollment strategies and embracing the school's long tradition of nimble transformation to meet the challenges of the day.

GOALS: Foster purposeful student relationships and engagements that build lifelong commitment to OA and an identity as an OA alum. Enhance the alumni database. Reorganization of the Advancement Office.

COMMUNITY. Oldenburg Academy serves students from across southeastern Indiana but is uniquely woven into the fabric of the Oldenburg/ Batesville area community. Opportunities are abundant for our students to enrich their education with hands-on, practical experiences. The community too, will benefit from enhanced collaboration and engagement.

GOAL: Develop an academic and collaborative relationship with Greenacres and strengthen local community partnerships.

Note: This is also OA's accreditation year that will focus on developing additional academic goals for the next several years.

Feldhaus

The OA Feldhaus - the newest building on campus, was completed last summer. Volleyball and Basketball are two of our 19 varsity sports that call this court home. Over 85% of our student body participates in athletics. OA student athletes go beyond the regular season and achieve their goals. We are very proud of our many student athletes and teams who receive academic awards throughout their season, with almost half receiving Academic-All State by Senior year. Makerspace

The OA Makerspace, StudiOA, is a new addition to the campus and is located in the center of the academic building. In order to have a hands on learning experience students will have access to this workspace and tools such as the 3D printers and laser cutter. Through project-based learning, the makerspace environment will help students build skills in an authentic, rigorous and motivating environment. StudiOA will help teachers to Go Beyond by incorporating hands on learning into curriculum.

Recent graduates Chris Hautman'21 and Jason Strohmeier '21 designed a pergola/outdoor classroom for their senior capstone project. The area has been enhanced with a beautiful pollinator garden and raised garden beds. These projects are examples of the cross-curricular learning experiences available at OA. This

space has also proven to be immediately valuable for our safe, social distancing needs.

Coffee Shop - The Friendly Bean

The Friendly Bean OA's sustainable coffee shop, is thriving under the direction of two students, Lizzie Geraci '22 and Anna Carballo '22. With their infectious attitude and superb coffee making skills, these young women have created a space for students to get a morning pick-me-up or a homemade snack. The coffee shop serves a variety of drinks all in glasses or returnable to-go cups—with the goal of reducing plastic waste at school. "I've learned how to make macchiatos, lattes, and frappes," remarks Geraci, "but more importantly, I've learned how to make coffee that the students want to buy."

And more students are buying the coffee, creating an atmosphere of camaraderie. "I like the feeling of family we get at the coffee shop," say Anna Carballo, "Everyone who comes in chats about their day, and working here has helped me get to know underclassmen and other people in the school." From 7:30 to 10, students stop in between periods and Seniors who have finished their internship for the day hang out before returning to class. The coffee shop is, as Carballo indicates, a lively place where the school meets and visits with each other. Even teachers find time to mingle with the students. Mr. Feller, a toasted marshmallow latte drinker, comments that "It's a time for people to interact with each other outside of the classroom setting, which is fun."

While the coffee shop certainly wants to be a place for social interaction, its other goal is an environmental one. Funds provided by the Hillenbrand VISION grant allowed OA to start the shop. The aim is to get students and faculty to make decisions that lessen the impact on the Earth. "I used to think reducing single-use plastics in my life was impossible, but the coffee shop has shown me many ways to achieve that goal," shares Carballo.

Lizzie Geraci was already concerned about the environment, so working at the Friendly Bean made sense.

"This internship is making an impact. With Dunkin serving coffee in plastic cups that are not recyclable, it's important to make decisions that reduce our plastic waste and this coffee shop does just that," points out Geraci. Geraci, who makes cinnamon rolls, blueberry pastries, and other delectable treats to sell, also sees other benefits. "We make it more accessible for students to grab a quick breakfast here at school. Having warm homemade baked goods brings a friendly personal touch to the morning," she says. Her classmates agree. Senior Elizabeth Gigrich made the switch to getting her coffee at the Friendly Bean, "Lizzie and Anna know my order and share new flavors they know I will love. The welcoming environment and sweet treats make my morning routine so enjoyable."

Both Geraci and Carballo hope the coffee shop has a sustaining presence as does the school. The intention is to reinvest all the store's profits into other sustainability efforts that will, ultimately, encourage all OA students to make choices with a focus on the environment. "It would be great if the Friendly Bean were the first step toward completely eliminating plastic waste here at our school and the inspiration for adopting more wide-ranging eco-friendly practices," observes Geraci. No doubt, future generations would agree. - Helen Yane '97, AP Environmental Science Teacher

For the 2021-22 school year, OA is focusing on our Franciscan sponsorship value of Care for Creation. This is especially appropriate as we continue to implement several sustainability projects begun last year (see p. XX Friendly Bean, Pollinator Garden and outdoor classroom). Our student leaders are making this a special goal for STUCO as well. During our October 4 Feast of St. Francis all school Mass, we heard some reflections from Sr. Mary Ann Stoffregen, OSF about some ways that the Sisters of St. Francis celebrated Pope Francis' "Season of Creation".

Another exciting collaboration recently launched is welcoming our newest "neighbors" to the Village of Oldenburg. Greenacres Foundation has recently purchased Michaela Farms from the Sisters of St. Francis. But have no fear. This dynamic organization is committed to many of the same values that have been the focus of Michaela for decades: sustainable agriculture, education, and the fine arts. Could there be a more perfect match?

OA wanted to dive a bit deeper into the vision that Greenacres has for Michaela Farms (the name will remain) and begin to explore partnership opportunities. The entire faculty and staff spent a day at Greenacres Indian Hill/Cincinnati campus learning first-hand, how they have been caring for creation as they serve students and the entire community since 1989.

Our Sophomores will spend part of their April retreat day providing service for Greenacres at Michaela Farms.

There are significant social events to look forward to: parties, athletic events, Prom.


With all these freedoms and decisions come expectations and responsibility.

Here at school, being a Junior means we have a level of expectation and responsibility for you because you are now an upperclassmen.


Turn around and look at the freshmen and sophomores for a second.
