OA GOING BEYOND EXPECTATIONS

ACCREDITATION

Accreditation is a very important priority to us at Oldenburg Academy. By going through this process, we are verifying that we prioritize using the best practices and procedures in all aspects of our school. This year, we completed two different accreditation processes. The first, an academic accreditation with Cognia, a nationwide leader in school accreditation. The second, a Catholic identity accreditation with the Archdiocese of Indianapolis. I would like to share with you the process we went through for each of these accreditations.

Our first step was to create a 3-year school improvement plan. We started with two resources: the Indiana State Comprehensive Needs Assessment and the National Standards and Benchmarks for Effective Catholic Elementary and Secondary Schools (NSBECS). Using the benchmarks from these standards, I created a 28-question survey for our staff in which we reflected on and graded our practices and policies in regard to Curriculum, Assessment, Technology, School Safety, Religion, Cultural competency and Behavior and Attendance. Next, I reached out to our staff and asked for volunteers to create a leadership team. I would like to personally thank those staff members (pictured below) who volunteered: Eric Feller (not pictured), Mary Gehring, Laura Geis, Susan Gigrich, David Jensen, Marshall Kellenburger, and Jenny Schneider. Amazingly enough, I asked for volunteers from the staff and I could not have hand-picked a more differentiated representation! This team put in many hours of work. We met before school weekly to analyze the results of the staff survey and to determine our essential next steps in our School Improvement process.

We identified areas of strengths and areas in which we could improve to come up with 3 goals for our School

Improvement Plan.

GOAL #1


Rewrite the expectations for our service hour program.

Goal #1: A goal based on our Catholic Identity – As with so many aspects of life, the COVID pandemic has drastically impacted our Service Hours Program. We have rewritten our expectations for this program and have included additional goals and expectations for our students.

Goal #2: An Academic Goal – We are implementing a program that will both remediate and enrich student learning in every single content area. Teachers are starting this process by identifying the specific learning targets in each course. This program follows a very strategic process in which the teacher identifies specific skills and students are able to track their progress on those skills. Both student and teacher know exactly what is expected and there is a plan in place for follow-up based on performance.

Goal #3: A Goal targeting Behavior and Attendance – We have the highest expectations for our students, this carries over to reaching, at minimum, stated expectations for both behavior and attendance. We have a committee to review our handbook and be sure that it upholds our high expectations.

The leadership team used the wording from NSBECS to create our three goals. We then presented these goals to our whole staff during multiple professional development days. Every staff member was included in writing the timelines and checkpoints for each goal.







After creating our School Improvement Plan, the leadership team's next undertaking was preparing for the Cognia review. There are three domains that were being evaluated by Cogina:

- 1. Leadership Capacity 10 indicators
- 2. Learning Capacity 12 indicators
- 3. Resource Capacity 8 indicator

During professional development time, the leadership team facilitated small groups through these indicators. The faculty and staff came up with evidence to show our strengths and areas of improvement in each of these indicators. We identified the documents that would be the most impactful at identifying the evidence needed for every indicator. On average, we came up with 10 documents for every indicator.

Our official Cognia Accreditation Review occurred February 7 - 9. On those days a review team from Cognia met with some of our Board members, our administrative team, every teacher, most of our staff, groups of parents, and our Student Council Members. The review team had hour long interviews with these groups and asked questions regarding our Learning, Leading, and Resource management. On March 11, we received our review findings and can officially announce that we have met and exceeded the national accreditation standards and are officially accredited for the next 5 years!

The Cognia review team identified several themes that support the continuous improvement journey Oldenburg Academy is already exhibiting. These themes present both strengths and opportunities to guide the improvement journey the school is actively pursuing. They include:

- Oldenburg Academy provides learners with equitable opportunities to develop attitudes, beliefs, and skills needed for future educational opportunities and careers.
- The school has implemented processes and procedures to support teaching and learning.
- A strong culture of positive relationships among staff and students promotes the goals of high achievement, support for all students, and future success.
- Strategic resource management, planning, and effective use of human, material, and fiscal resources contribute to improved student performance, organizational effectiveness, and support for the school's purpose and direction.
- Continued focus in establishing processes for gathering, analyzing, applying, and communicating organizational, program, and instructional data is encouraged.

The third step to our accreditation processes this year was accreditation through the Archdiocese of Indianapolis based on their model of Continuous Improvement Journey (CIJ). To prepare for this visit, we again used the NSBECS. On February 17, a review team from the Archdiocese visited our campus. This team met with the administrative team, students, Campus Ministry team, Theology teachers, and parents. Because we had just completed the documentation for the Cognia review, this team reviewed our School Improvement Plan, was updated on our Cognia Documentation, and focused on our Catholic Identity and our mission effectiveness. The review team expressed strong support for the many clear and consistent examples of how OA is following the mandate to "teach as Jesus did". They especially noted how articulate our students are in expressing their support for the various opportunities they have to share and deepen their faith at OA.

Overall, these three steps were a huge undertaking. This process has affirmed the strength, excellence, and vibrancy of our faculty and staff! I would like to personally thank every person that was involved. The faculty, staff, parents, students, and Board members that took their time to help in this very impactful and important process. Reflection and Growth are key to progress. We want to be the absolute best school around, and this process helps us identify our strengths and weaknesses. It helps us focus our priorities and goals. It requires us to spend the time and resources needed to evaluate all aspects of who we are and what we do. It allows us to Go Beyond our daily norms and push to be the best we can be!

STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

When the strategic plan was introduced last fall, we said teachers and their passion for the classroom represent Oldenburg Academy of the Immaculate Conception's (OA's) greatest and most significant asset. While continuously developing the skills of any faculty is essential, strengthening and re-envisioning professional development is critical for ongoing excellence. The development of faculty cannot be episodic; rather, it needs to be lifelong and sustained. We have asked our teachers to take full advantage of additional pay and professional development offered through the newly established Educator Empowerment Fund (EEF). This strategic initiative was established in the last few months to reward and recognize all teachers for their excellence in teaching and professional development. If you were not aware, EEF was the school's fundraising project at the dinner auction on February 26. Many thanks to everyone who contributed to this endowed fund before, during, and since the event. We expect to reach our EEF goal of \$100,000 in collective contributions early this spring.

Balancing the budget is challenging for a small private school like OA where income is derived from enrollment (tuition dollars), grants, scholarships and fundraising. Please know that OA's administration and Board of Trustees are committed to paying teachers the best we can. According to the current recommended Indianapolis Archdiocesan Salary Schedule, our teachers are competitively paid compared to teachers across the Archdiocese. There is a compensation gap in comparison to public schools, however. An overwhelming majority of teachers said in a recent opinion survey that it was important to work in a school with small class sizes and where a family-like atmosphere exists. This echoes the many responses received from all stakeholders during the inception phase of the strategic plan. These two strengths set us apart from most schools and are hallmarks of our success. We believe our teachers view these attributes as "intrinsic benefits" of their employment.

Several other Board of Trustees subcommittees are actively meeting on: Academic Goals, Student Enrollment and Retention, Advancement, and Student/Alumni Engagement that fosters lifelong commitment to Oldenburg Academy. As we work through the strategies related to our academic goals, close attention is on recent partner grade school and current parent surveys. Feedback from those surveys is being utilized as decisions are considered about curricular priorities and operational school goals.

While education is ever-changing the school's mission has not changed. Please know that our students, faculty, administration and Board of Trustees are all focused on the mission below as we navigate the challenges of our time. The world in which our students will walk will demand an understanding of multiple perspectives and where plurality will be the norm.



Our student athletes, under the talented guidance and supervision of Coach Shane Coppotelli, are receiving expert strength and conditioning training at no additional cost.





Legacy Story: Ann Moeller Wesseler'61 Independent Spirit Scholarship Established 2021

Ann Moeller Wesseler was born in Hamburg, IN, the second of 5 children of a farming family. Though her parents did not have the opportunity to finish high school, they recognized that Ann was bright, and that a Catholic education was extremely valuable. With help from them and additional support from the local Hamburg parish, St. Anne's, Ahn was able to attend the Academy of the Immaculate Conception. She graduated in 1961 but going to college was not an option for many women at the time, let alone those with little financial means - so she took typing and shorthand classes, worked secretarial jobs, and eventually took on the traditional roles of wife and mother. But she never lost a desire to further her education, and she was finally able to enroll at Indiana University in her late 30's, receiving her bachelor's degree in 1984. Unfortunately, her marriage ended soon after, and she found herself as a single parent faced with providing for three young kids on her own. Remembering the value of her own Catholic education, she was determined to keep her kids in Catholic schools. To make that happen, she capitalized on her college degree to become a full time Human Resources manager. After retiring, she volunteered at her parish school, and continued to financially support Oldenburg Academy. Her children, by the way, took note - they also successfully completed Catholic schooling, received college degrees, and thanks to Ann - have

strong careers and their own independence.

Through her own life experience, Ann knew that self-reliance - especially for a single mother - is a necessity - and she recognized that faith, education, and grit are keys to achieving that. Through this scholarship fund, her family honors others who demonstrate those same qualities, and seeks to lend encouragement to both parents and children as they travel together on their journeys toward growth and independence.
